From the RMR President

The convention in Cheyenne was a great success. I for one had a great time judging the contest and on the UP shop tour. The number of models entered in the contest was impressive, as was the quality. And the banquet was one of the best ever! I pity those who missed it. My thanks go to Bob Sherwood and all of his helpers for an excellent convention.

The BOD passed a number of initiatives:

- 1. The Bylaws revision was approved. The next task will be revision to the region constitution.
- 2. A committee was formed to look into the adoption of regional module standards. These may or may not be NMRA standards, but they will be designed to suit our needs. The idea is to have the region build and maintain at least four corner modules, and encourage the membership and divisions to build modules to these standards and bring them to the regional conventions.
- 3. Our next BOD meeting will be in Pueblo at the Country Buffet on Saturday, October 8. Dinner will be at 5:00 and meeting at 6:00 p.m. In addition to the BOD members, all Region members are welcome to attend and see what we do during these meetings. There will also be operating sessions early Sunday and perhaps Saturday afternoon depending on responses. There may also be guided tours of the Pueblo Railroad Museum. These activities are open to all Region members. (Let Fred Carlson know if you want to attend an operating session and Jock Peters for the museum tour. Any NMRA member residing within the RMR boundaries is a Region member. Ed.)

The BOD meeting very nearly didn't happen due to a lack of participation. With one less member or proxy, we wouldn't have had a quorum. I addressed this deplorable situation with a separate email to the BOD. We need people who are interested in turning this region around to become a vibrant, active organization. Elections will be held early next year for all four executive positions and three directors. If you are one of those people who want to help, send your resume to Bob Sherwood at "softmoods@vcn.com". The last two elections were uncontested. That is not the sign of a healthy organization!

I want to take a minute to thank all of you that entered the contest this year. We had more entries than the previous year, and more merit award quality models as well. I also want to thank those members that took some time out of their Convention time on Saturday to help judge the models in the contest room. We had a great bunch of judges this year and I thank you all.

Yours truly even picked up a couple of merit awards, which brings me to this month's sales pitch for the Achievement Program. I know many of you are intimidated by the requirements for the Achievement Program. I'm right there with you on that account. I thought I would take a few inches in this issue to pass along my personal experiences. This is not an effort to blow my own horn but rather to show it can be done!

I set a goal for myself last fall to complete the requirements for the Master Builder Cars category. Mind you, I had never built a piece of rolling stock prior to my conversion to Sn3 in July of 2004.

Before starting the first car, I mapped out my strategy. I selected projects carefully. I would need to have 8 cars, of 4 different types. 4 of the 8 cars had to be scratch built while the remaining 4 would need to be super-detailed. 4 of the 8 cars would also need to earn a merit award. When I had decided on my 8 project cars, I started to work. I have to admit this was a bit of an obsession at times. I also have to thank my patient spouse for allowing me a lot more hobby time than would normally be acceptable. I worked over the winter months and finished the last car a few weeks before the convention.

I had under estimated one aspect of my chase for Master Builder Cars award. The paper work was a killer! I spent two full weekends just getting my paper work ready to enter my models in the contest. I will pass along one tip to you. Make two copies of this paper work, as you will have to submit it with your application for Master Builder Cars.

With models and paper work safely packed away, I made my way to Cheyenne. I was happy to see my models made it past the scrutiny of the judges. I was able to come back from this years contest with all of my requirements met for the application for Master Builder Cars. The point I want to make here is this can be accomplished, and it won't take 10 years of toiling away at your workbench. Don't be discouraged by the requirements. Any thing worthwhile takes some amount of effort. Now on to Master Builder Structures!

2006 Election Robert Sherwood

There are Three Elected Directors and all Four of the Officers whose terms will expire next year. That's seven positions that will need to be filled on the Region Board of Directors (Officers are members of the BOD). Election of individuals to so many positions happens every even - numbered year - - see the RMR Bylaws, Article V. Any NMRA member residing within the RMR boundaries and in good standing is eligible to declare and run for the Director and Officer positions. Of course an incumbent may choose to "run" for election again, provided he / she is not "term limited". The Directors positions and President and Vice President are limited to two consecutive terms. The Secretary and the Treasurer may hold unlimited terms, but they may not want to serve indefinitely.
